READING (10 points)**Time: 30 minutes**

Task 1. You are going to read an article about night school. Seven paragraphs have been removed from the text. Choose from the sentences A-H the one which fits each gap (1-6). There is one extra paragraph which you do not need to use. There is an example at the beginning (0).

NIGHT SCHOOL

What would you do if you couldn't attend school during the day? If you are an adult who didn't finish secondary school, what possibilities are there for you? A growing number of people around the world are looking for an option that really meets their needs.

Night school is an educational option that exists in many countries of the world. Since formal schooling is compulsory until the age of 16 or 18 in many places, young people who find themselves in need of work or have other important daytime obligations can finish their studies. For many people, it's the right choice.

Young people are not the only ones who face this choice, however. Night school also attracts adults who left school early. Since they are already working adults, night school can give them the opportunity to go back to school without leaving their jobs.

2 _____

Courses in night school are usually the same as those taught during the day. They are generally held in the same buildings, too. Students have the same facilities and the same requirements as their fellow students during the day. All in all, the experiences are the same. The only difference is that night school students go to school later!

3 _____

Michael is a 17-year-old boy who works during the day on his family's organic farm. It's a new business which requires a lot of careful attention to get started. Michael's

father runs the farm now, but one day it will be Michael's responsibility, which is why he needs to learn as much as he can about the business. Since he didn't want to stop his schooling in order to work, he enrolled in night school. 'It was a bit strange at first,' he says, 'working all day then going to school in the evening, but I soon got used to it. In my classes there are a lot of students who work during the day like I do, so we have many things in common. I've made really good friends.'

Then we talked to Tonia, who is a teacher at night school. She used to teach during the day, but prefers evening classes now. 'The night students are very dedicated,' she told us. 'It's also really nice to have a mix of adults and teens. They work hard, but they have a lot of fun, too.'

5 _____

Take David, for example. He's a teenager who tried going to night school for a while so he could train as a carpenter with his uncle during the day. 'I was so tired after working all day that I didn't have the energy to go to school! And when could I do my homework? In my sleep? No way! I'd rather do one thing at a time.' David decided to work part-time on weekends and finish school during the day.

For most of the students who do enroll, however, night school is the answer they've been looking for. It is a challenge to balance work and school, and it's definitely not for everyone. But those who go to night school are really making the most of their time – day and night!

A Many students also take summer classes, usually to make up for bad grades during the year. They have to pass the summer course in order to move to the next level in the autumn when the new term begins.

B More and more young people are taking on the responsibility of a job during the day, for different reasons. Perhaps they have to help out their families, or maybe they

want to learn a particular skill or trade. But if they work during the day, how can they complete their studies? Is their only choice to leave school at an early age?

C Different people react in different ways to the experience, and not all of them enjoy it. We visited one school that runs classes in the evening and talked to students and a teacher to find out more. Let's meet them and see what they have to say.

D Not everyone, of course, thinks that night school is the answer. Some people don't think there's enough time in one day for both school and work. Certainly, working during the day and going to school at night can be hard.

E Fortunately, there is an alternative to going to school during the day - night school. Night school offers the same classes as regular secondary school except during evening hours. This evening programme allows students to continue working during the day and study at night.

F Parents might also object to night school. Meg is a teenager who wanted to leave school to take up a career in modelling. When Meg looked into going to night school, her parents warned her against it. 'They thought I would never finish school that way. My parents think working and going to night school is too much for someone my age. I disagree, but I'm only 17 so I have to do what they say.'

G Next we spoke to Cheryl, a young adult in her 20s who dropped out of school as a teenager. Later, however, she realised that she didn't have the skills and qualifications she needed for her career, so she decided to return to school. Since she works during the day, night school was the perfect option. 'Going to night school has been a great opportunity for a second start. I can keep my job and complete my studies,' Cheryl explained.

H What's night school like? How is it the same - or different - from school during the day? Here we present an up-close and personal look at night school.

- 8.** My best day was a school trip to the Forest of Dean Sculpture Trail. As I had never arranged a school trip before, I worked closely with the Year 4 teacher to learn from her what I needed to do.
- 9.** I learnt a lot from my colleague and I can confidently say now that I could organize a school outing on my own.
- 10.** At this point, I imposed my authority – I may be just 1 meter 60, but I can really shout – and the group of boys who had been causing the problem stopped. I gave the whole class some warnings of my own. But later, the victim hit one of the boys who had been using bad language. I attempted to separate them, but the victimized boy started to have a problem with his breathing and began to cough.
- 11.** My worst day happened when I was with a class of 11-year-olds and there was trouble with a gang of boys. They were swearing and making threats to another boy in the class. They thought he was a ‘swot’ - he worked too hard.
- 12.** I remembered from my time at university that you had to do a risk assessment before a trip. This meant visiting the sculpture park and noting anything that may cause accidents – for example, steep hills or streams.
- 13.** My class can be a difficult group and I was worried about their behaviour on this trip. But the day was really great – we came back totally relaxed. The children were brilliant, enjoying every part of the day, and we were really proud of them.
- 14.** But the experience has not put me off. It was just a bad day and most teachers get those. So do children. In any case, I enjoy a challenge and will not be defeated.
- 15.** Doing the research meant my colleague and I knew what to expect and felt fully prepared. There were 52 children on the trip – they were split into groups of 4 and 5, and each group allocated an adult.
